Moral InjurySummary of Pof. Harold G. Koenig`s Keynote Lecture

Harold G. Koenig, professor of psychiatry and medicine at the Medical Center of Duke University in Durham, USA, spoke on the topic of "Moral Injury" (MI). Koenig does research on MI for serveral years, mirrored by a number of scientific articles.


Scientific research on MI started after the **Vietnam war** and was initially focussed on veterans, who became victims, perpetrators or witnesses of events injuring their moral sentiment in an extreme manner. Here we already have a quite precise definition of MI, including the difference to Posttraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). Moral aspects do not belong to the main symptoms of PTSD. Nevertheless the areas of PTSD and MI have much in common, because both problems result from traumatic experiences.

Empirical research on MI is new, whereas the experience itself is as old as mankind. Veterans of war are struck by MI to a very high degree. Meanwhile lots off studies have been published about the matter and a number of questionnaires in order to diagnose MI exist.

For the **treatment of MI** Koenig recommends the following methods: Psychological practices from conventional Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CPT) and Mindfulness Based Therapy, for example Adaptive Disclosure Training, spiritually centered aids as Building Spiritual Strength and Spiritual-Integrated Cognitive Processing Therapy (SICPT), complemented by interdisciplinary cooperation with theological experts as chaplains, who represent the individual confession of the affected person.

SICPT therapy contains 12 sessions. The basic model can be adapted according to the individual religious background. Patients shall become aware of their own spiritual ressources and learn an empathic encounter with their inner conflicts instead of blaming themselves. They shall deal with the meaning of guilt and forgiveness and succeed in helpful new appraisals. In order to internalize these they shall cultivate a closer connection to their religious community, if possible, and deepen their personal spiritual life.

This schedule is complemented by a pastoral care program, which also contains 12 sessions. It should be guided by a spiritually competent person and can be considered to be a matter of pastoral counselling.

The medical concept of MI originally stems from traumatic experiences in war. But meanwhile MI has become a relevant factor in health services. This is emphatically addressed by Koenig, which can easily be seen by taking a look at his lecture's headline: "Moral Injury in Mental Health Care - what can we learn from the Veterans Studies?"

Further investigating MI and the effectivness of therapies is an urgent task for further research.

First aef-Workshop on religious faith, psychotherapy and pastoral counseling

During springtime the "Arbeitskreis für Empirische Forschung zu Glaube, Psychotherapie und Seelsorge" (aef) gathered to further constitute itself. In October 14-15 the first aef-Workshop was held at the Internationale Hochschule Liebenzell (IHL) near Suttgart in the northern area of Black Forest. First part of the event was a Pre-Workshop by Professor Stefan Huber, head of the Institute for Empirical Research on Religion at Bern University, Switzerland, concerning qualitative case studies with the purpose of reconstructing individual faith dimensions.

The second day was filled with scientific presentations of ongoing academic research projects on matters of religious faith, psychotherapy and pastoral counseling, mainly master- and doctoral theses. Much time was taken for discussions, led and contributed by the participating academic experts, among others Prof. Ulrich Giesekus of IHL, Prof. Henning Freund of Ev. Hochschule Tabor in Marburg, Germany, Dr. Sonja Friedrich-Killinger, psychotherapist and researcher, Stuttgart, Germany, and René Hefti MD, senior lecturer at the University of Basel and head of the Research Institute of Spiritualty and Health, Langenthal, Switherland, which is one of the cooperating partners of the aef working group.


